The men re-committed the body to the deep, and retained the sou'wester, that being the only means of establishing identification.

"HARD TIMES FOR THE FATHERLAND."

Kaiser's Significant Reply

To Congratulations from Reichstag.
("Times" Telegram, per Press Association.)
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Amsterdam, Monday.

The President of the Reichstag has sent the following message to the Kaiser:—"I beg your Imperial and Royal Majesty to accept the most respectful and hearty good wishes of the Reichstag on the occasion of the New Year. May Almighty God save under His gracious protection your Imperial and Royal Majesty, the whole Imperial and Royal house, and our beloved Fatherland, and may enduring peace, for which the whole German people stakes to the uttermost its property and blood, be granted to us, so that Germany can fulfil in the world its high task of culture."

The Kaiser replied:—"I am most gratified by the faithful good wishes of the Reichstag, and I express to you my warmest thanks. I hope to God that all the profound wishes which move the heart of the German people in the hard times for our dear Fatherland may be fulfilled."

To the Berlin Chamber of Commerce the Kaiser telegraphed:—"My hearty thanks for good wishes at the New Year. I trust that all the worries inflicted on German economic life by the war, and borne with courageous sacrifice, will be healed and compensated in the better future."

DEATH OF MR. MAURICE McCARTHY.

An old and much respected citizen passed away on Sunday in the person of Mr Maurice McCarthy, grocer and spirit merchant, Wickham street, who had been in weak health for some time past. Mr McCarthy was able to be about, and on Sunday he attended Mass in one of the city churches. Feeling faint, however, he was removed to the vestibule where he gradually grew worse, death eventually occurring through heart failure. There is much sympathy with Mr McCarthy's relatives from a numerous circle of friends, who held the deceased in much regard. Mr McCarthy was some seventy-three years of age.

The funeral took place to-day from St Michael's Chapel, whither the remains had been removed yesterday. The interment was in Mount St Lawrence Cemetery, and there was a large attendance of the friends and acquaintances of the deceased. The officiating clergymen were the Rev F Hanan, C.C., St Michael's, and the Rev Fr Thomashill, C.C., do. Rev Fr O'Donoghue, C.C., Capemore, a relative of Mr McCarthy was also present.
