THE LATE MR KEATING, RATE COLLECTOR.

As soon as the business commenced
The Chairman, in sympathetic terms, referred
to the death of Mr Michael Keating, rate collector,
and a brother of a most respected member of the
Board. He was a severe loss to a large and young
family, and the people all over the district
sympathised with his relatives. He would move
the adjournment of the Board as a tribute of
respect to his memory.

Mr Ryan, in seconding the resolution, dwelt on
Mr Keating's loss to the people—the rich and the
poor alike.

Mr Moloney, and Mr Kelly, Clerk, supported
the resolution, which was adopted.

On the motion of Mr Wm Carmody, J.P,
seconded by Mr Michael Moloney, a resolution
was passed asking the Law and General Purposes
Committee of the County Council to appoint Mr
J J Keating to the position of rate collector *pre-
tem*. The resolution pointed out that the deceased
Collector, who held the office for more than 16
years, discharged his duties with marked zeal and
ability to the entire satisfaction of the County
Council and the public generally, and further
stated that the late Mr Keating's brother had
undertaken to look after the widow and orphans
of the deceased by every means in his power. Mr
J J Keating had acted as assistant to his brother
during his illness.

The resolution was adopted, and the Board
adjourned.

LEAP IN RATES.

Heavy Increases in Leeds and Liverpool.

The overseers of Liverpool have presented a
rate showing an increase of 7½d in the pound.
The rate for education purposes shows an increase
of 4d and the poor rate 3d in the pound. The
rates of Leeds are to be advanced 1s in the
pound. This is chiefly due to the decreased in-
come from the city's trading undertakings as a
result of the war. The rates are at present
something over 9s in the pound.
