DEATH OF A MEMBER OF AN OLD LIMERICK FAMILY

We regret to announce the death of an old and respected Limerick lady, after a short illness, Mrs Margaret Donnellan, widow of the late Mr John Donnellan, of Mount Kennett House, who passed away in London on the 11th inst. Mrs Donnellan was the elder daughter, by his second marriage, of Mr James Clampett, of Limerick, who was a grandson of Isaac Clampett, Mayor of this city in 1739. Mr James Clampett was born in 1767, and died in 1871, in his 104th year. He preserved a remarkable retentive memory to the end, and was a mine of information concerning the South of Ireland and Limerick during his life-time. Mrs Donnellan was born in 1830, had a large family, of whom four were sons, all members of the medical profession, and three daughters, two of whom are nuns in the Loretto Order, survive her. In view of the conditions arising from the war, it has been decided that Mrs Donnellan's funeral will not take place at Mount St Lawrence, as was originally intended, but the remains will be interred, at any rate temporarily, at Harrow-on-the-Hill on the 14th inst.

COMPENSATION CLAIM FOR CATTLE DRIVE

At Rathkeale Quarter Sessions to-day, before his Honor County Court Judge Law-Smith, Mr Robert M D Saunders, J.P., Charleville, claimed £200 as compensation for loss and damage to one hundred and twenty head of cattle, and two hundred and thirty sheep, driven off his farm at Newtown, Pallaskenry, on the 6th January last. The application was opposed by the Limerick County Council, the Rathkeale District Council, and certain ratepayers, for whom Messrs O'Sullivan, Limerick; Cosgrove, Rathkeale, and Condon, Newcastle West, solicitors, appeared.
