### LIMERICK PRIEST'S DEATH.

Genuine regret has been felt in the City and County Limerick at the death of the Very Rev Canon John Carrick, P.P., which took place at the Presbytery, Kilfinane yesterday, in his 76th year. The deceased clergyman was an old citizen of Limerick, and popular with all classes in the diocese. He officiated as curate in several parishes of the diocese, including Bruff, Killmallock, and Ardfatrick. For twenty-three years he was Parish Priest of Kilfinane, previous to which he was Pastor of Monogay. He was an accomplished clergyman, and a life-long friend of the Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, who in the recent constitution of the Cathedral Chapter appointed him to a Canonry. The funeral will take place on Thursday after Office and Requiem High Mass.
