## DEATH OF DR R. G. CHRISTY

We regret to record the unexpected demise of  
 Dr Robert George Christy, second son of the late  
 Mr William Christy, 58 George street, Limerick,  
 which took place on the 8th instant on board  
 the R.M.S.P. "Darro" in the Atlantic Ocean.  
 The sad news received is, necessarily, as  
 yet meagre, but it is supposed that Dr  
 Christy succumbed to the effects of a cold. A  
 few weeks ago he was home in Limerick after a  
 sea voyage, looking much improved in health, and  
 the intelligence of his death will, therefore, come  
 as a great shock to a wide circle of friends here,  
 and in London. The deceased gentleman took  
 out his Surgeon's qualifications in 1885, and  
 Physician's three years later, in the Royal  
 College of Surgeons, Ireland, and for several  
 years he enjoyed an extensive practice in  
 West Chiswick. A man of a most kindly, sympa-  
 thetic, and genial disposition, he was de-  
 voted to his profession. In consequence of  
 overwork, his health suffered, and he relinquished  
 his practice in the metropolis some twelve months  
 ago. Later on, and some time after the war  
 broke out, he took up the position of medical officer  
 on board ship, and went on a voyage to Buenos  
 Ayres and back, which benefited him very much.  
 He returned home, as stated, quite recently for a  
 few days, and again took up another appointment,  
 this time on board the R.M.S.P. "Darro." His  
 premature demise is sincerely regretted, and the  
 sympathy of numerous friends will be extended to  
 his relatives in their sorrow.

## MEMORY OF BYRON.

British Poet and Present-day Crisis  
 in Greece.

 death at Missolonghi in 1824. As is the custom  
 each year, the only memorial of the poet in  
 London—the statue behind Apsley House—was  
 richly decorated with lilies and roses, the flowers

A protest was entered against the proposal

## "PRODIGES OF VALOUR."

The Royal Irish Regiment is the  
 best of Irish Regiments in the service  
 of the King, having been raised in 1684  
 and incorporated in the British Army  
 four years later. In 1692 it proceeded to  
 Flanders, and at the taking of Namur  
 performed "prodigies of valour." On  
 the 20th of August 1695 the regiment  
 was called upon to support the Grenadi-  
 ers, who were to lead the attack on  
 the breach, but who were beaten back  
 by the tremendous fire of the defenders.  
 In the face of circumstances that would  
 daunt a less heroic Army, the Irishmen  
 swept forward, and pressing through the  
 tempest of fire and surging over the  
 ruins of the breach, never paused until  
 the colours of the regiment were waving  
 triumphantly from the summit of their  
 goal. In the South African war of 1900  
 they rendered brilliant service, and were  
 mentioned in orders for their admirable  
 marching powers, splendid dash, and  
 wonderful endurance. The men from

## THE ROCHE-KELLY ESTATE.

At the Bruff Quarter Sessions, before Cour-  
 Court Judge Law Smith, James Garvey claim-  
 £30 damages from William O'Dwyer for trespas-  
 on his lands on the Roche-Kelly estate at Fria-  
 town. Mr Holmes, B.7. (instructed by Messrs  
 S' Connolly & Co, solicitors, Limerick), appear-  
 for the plaintiff, and Mr J J Power, solicitor  
 Kilmallock, for the defendant.

Complainant stated that defendant had  
 various dates in 1914 eleven "Polly" eat  
 grazing on his lands, which he intended mead-  
 ing, and estimated his loss at 3 tons of hay to  
 acre.

Defendant admitted the trespass, and sa-  
 plaintiff was not one of the parties to whom the  
 objected, and that the trespass was accidental  
 and not deliberate.

Mr Power said it was one of a series of cases  
 arising out of the division of the Friarstown  
 lands, a number of which had been heard already  
 and in addition to the actual loss for the trespas-  
 committed, damages had been awarded. He ad-  
 mitted that the plaintiff should get nothing  
 more than he suffered in loss.

His Honor said people must confine their cost  
 to their own lands. He could make no distinc-  
 tion between this and the other cases, and would  
 give a decree for £25.
