We regret to record the unexpected demise of Dr Robert George Christy, second son of the late Mr William Christy, 58 George street, Limerick, which took place on the 8th instant on board the R.M.S.P. "PRODIGIES OF VALOUR."

The Royal lish Regiment is the dest of Irish Regiments in the service of the King, having been raised in 1684 and incorporated in the British Army four years later. On the 20th of August 1695 the regiment was called upon to support the Grenadiers, who were to lead the attack on the breach, but who were beaten back by the tremendous fire of the defenders. In the face of circumstances that would daunt a less heroic Army, the Irishmen swept forward, and pressing through the tempest of fire and surging over the ruise of the breach, never paused until the colours of the regiment were waving triumphantly from the summit of their goal.
