"GEORGE J. FOGERTY MEMORIAL

An appeal which we publish in our dvertising columns this evening from the Managing Committee relative to the proposed memorial in Barrington's Hospital to the late lamented Dr. George J. Fogerty, R.N., is one, we feel assured, that will very warmly commend itself to the people of the city and county. For many years Dr. Fogerty was Assistant Hon. [Secretary o the Hospital, and he most cheerfully devoted his services at all times to the welfare of the Institution, the patients, and all connected with it. He was a daily visitor to the house, in the management of which he took the keenest interest. His demise has been a great and an undoubted loss to the Hospital, the many friends of which, we feel certain, will very heartily support the intended memorial—the dedication of a ward and the erection of a suitable brass tablet-to his work and worth. In addition, the time is opportune and pressing for the issue of the appeal. Since 1831 Barrington's Hospital has done a noble work for the sick and suffering in this city. The demands on the accommodation in the Institution have always been pressing, and perhaps never more so than since the outbreak of the war. Forty-five beds have been occupied by wounded soldiers sent there by the military authorities, and these beds are kept always ready for the wounded. The hospital, despite the most efficient and careful management, has for some back years gradually got into debt, until the overdraft at the bank now amounts to £2,700. In addition, then, to carrying out a suitable memorial to one who was so long and closely identified with the hospital, we trust that the result of the Appeal will be to relieve the Institution from all financial difficulty, and thus prevent, as the Appeal says, "the possibility of any portion of the hospital being closed, and its benefit to the sick thereby curtailed." It need only be added that shortly before his death, Dr George Foggrty expressed a wish that a fund should be raised to pay off the debt on the hospital.

Tolegrams received in Dublin, this afternoon from all over Ireland, especially from towns where small breweries or distilleries are, re-echo opposition to the Government. From all these towns opposition to the Government. From all these towns —Belfast, Waterford, Cork, Kilkenny, Clennel, Sligd, etc—messages were received to the effect that if adopted in their present form the proposals spell ruin to brewers, licensed traders, and larmers, who this year have sown barley in large

quantities.

Inquiries made yesterday, writes the Irish Trimes, amongst those interested in the various industries affected by the proposals of the Chancellor of the Exchequer for dealing with the liquor traffic elicited the existence of a feeling of uneasiness amounting almost to consternation. Brewers, distillers, and others interested in the liquer traffic believe that, if the proposals of Mr Lloyd George become law in their present form, all branches of the trade will be ruined.

The extent to which the city is affected by the proposed taxation was illustrated by the

atatsment made yesterday by an ex-President of the Licensed Grocers' and Vintners' Association, who pointed out that in the Dublin brewery alone some 5,000 persons were employed representing between ten and eleven thousand dependents. "And in my opinion," added this gentleman, "the additional impost means the wiping out of the distilling trade and the disemployment of many hands. In fact, I would prefer that we licensed traders were closed-up forthwith." up forthwith."

This expression of opinion was one which was emphasised by many other licensed traders, some of whom, however, expressed a doubt as to whether the proposals of the Chancellor would ever become law. "I think the measure is far too drastic to be passed by Parliament." said a city trader. "I think that the Government brought it into the House for the purpose of getting it rejected, and trea throw the blame and responsi bility on some section of the House."

PUBLIC MEETING IN THE PHOENIX PARK,

A public meeting, organised by the Licensed Gropers' and Vinturers' Association, will be held on Sunday next in the Phoenix Park, at 1 o'clock, for the purpose of protesting against the proposals of the Chancellor of the Exphequer to impose fur-ther taxation on Iteland. It is expected that Alderman Cordigan, locum tenens for the Lord Mayor, will preside.

LIMERICK.

In connection with other centres throughout Ireland, a very strong feeling of opposition exists in the licensed trade in Limerick, and a large number of the public, to the proposals of Mr Lloyd George as to the increase of duties on spirits and beer. The trade, of pourse, regards the contemplated shange as pertain to oripple their business very seriously, and it is probable that a proble meeting will be held in the city to consider the situation, and the possible outlook that it may lead to.
