GOVERNMENT AND DRINK PROBLEM.

Bill Introduced by Attorney-General.

The Attorney-General, in the House of Commons to-day, introduced a bill to restrict the sale and supply of immature spirits. The bill provides that with certain exceptions spirits must be warehoused for three years before being sold. He stated the surtaxes on beer and wines would be removed at once, but that on spirits would be retained until this bill was passed.

DEATH OF MR JAMES ALEXANDER

Very general and sincere regret is felt by a large number of friends and acquaintances at the death of Mr James Alexander, a native of Scotland, and a resident in the city for a number of years past. Mr Alexander, who was about sixty years of age, was employed as cutter at the firm of Messrs McBriney and Co, and his genial, courteous manner, and strict attention to business, made him a great favourite. He was a man of excellent character, as all who had relations with him, socially or in business, realised. He was missing since Wednesday last and on Sunday morning he was, regrettable to state, found drowned near St Michael's Rowing Club Boat-house, where his body was recovered from the river.

Yesterday an inquest was held by Mr. J. F. Barry, Coroner, and a verdict of accidental drowning returned, the jury adding a rider expressing sympathy with the widow and relatives of the deceased.
