DEATH OF VERY REV DEAN SHANAHAN. P.P. V.G.

We regret very much to have to record the death of the Very Rev T. R. Shanahan, P.P., V.G. Roman Catholic Dean of Limerick, which occurred yesterday evening at the Parochial House, Thomondgate. The late Dean who had attained the patriarchal age of 86 years, was a native of County Limerick, and all his ministerial life was spent in this Diocese. In his early years he was a curate in St Michael's Parish, becoming subsequently Administrator of St Mary's Parish. Later on he was appointed to the Pastoral charge of Ballingarry, where he spent many years. He erected the handsome new Gothic Church in that town, and presented the Sisters of Mercy with a conventual establishment. From Ballingarry he was translated to the parish of St Munchin, where he displayed the same earnestness and zeal in the performance of the duties of his sacred office until failing health obliged him some five years ago to resign the Pastoral charge, in which he was succeeded by the late lamented Very Rev Andrew Murphy. The late Father Shanahan was a close personal friend of the Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, who appointed him to the Deanery of the diocese. He was brother of Rev D R Shanahan, P.P., St Mary's; Monsignor Gerard Shanahan, Thorub-on-Tee, and of Dr J F Shanahan of this city. The late Dean was held in the highest esteem by all classes and creeds, and he was in his time associated with public life as a member of the Limerick Asylum Board and other institutions. The news of his death has been heard of with deep regret in the city and county, and general sympathy is expressed with his relatives in their bereavement. The remains will be removed to St John's Cathedral this evening, where they will lie over Sunday. On Monday at 10.30 there will be solemn High Mass, at which Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer will preside. The funeral to Mount St Lawrence Cemetery will take place immediately afterwards.
