SUICIDE IN KILMALLOCK WORKHOUSE

Coroner M R Cleary, M.D. held an inquest a the Boardroom of the Workhouse. Kilmallook on Thomas Quirke, an inmate of the institution, who was found on May 6th, suffering from injuries to the thicat.

Mr Matthew Q'Mahony was foreman of the iery.

Sergeant Quirke represented the pelice.

The first witness examined was Mr John Martin Master of the Workhou e, who deposed that Quirke came from the Co Tipperary on the Stat April. He was a widdwer, 69 years of age, and originally had been a farmer. He was in the infiers part of the house.

Affoliael Dillane, a little boy, stated that on the day in question he was in the wash house before dinner. Quirke came in and told him to go out, which he did, and on going back for his towel he saw blood.

Se geant Quirks-Was he about shaving himsell : I don't know, sir. I only saw bloed on the floor. I then went and beld Joan Walsh, To the Coroner—I saw Quitke, and blood

flowing from his neck?

Did you see enything with him? No, sir; saw blood on his hands, but I saw nothing in them.

Sergeant Quirke-Was there anyone in the wash bouse but himself ?- No, sir.

John Walsh stated that he was in the day-room when the young fellow came and said a man was cutting his throat in the bath-room (wash-house) He went to the door and saw blood on Quirke's ja s and face, and a razor is his hand. He did not see Quirke do anything with it. The razor was open, and Quirke held it with his hand extended. Half a dozen people came, and Quirke was removed to the hospital.
