## SUICIDE IN KILMALLOCK WORKHOUSE.

Coroner M R Cleary, M.D, held an inquest at  
the Boardroom of the Workhouse, Kilmallock,  
on Thomas Quirke, an inmate of the institution,  
who was found on May 6th, suffering from  
injuries to the throat.

Mr Matthew O'Mahony was foreman of the  
jury.

Sergeant Quirke represented the police.  
The first witness examined was Mr John  
Martin, Master of the Workhouse, who deposed  
that Quirke came from the Co Tipperary on the  
21st April. He was a widower, 69 years of age,  
and originally had been a farmer. He was in the  
inferm part of the house.

Michael Dillane, a little boy, stated that on  
the day in question he was in the wash house  
before dinner. Quirke came in and told him to  
go out, which he did, and on going back for his  
towel he saw blood.

Se geant Quirke—Was he about shaving him-  
self?—I don't know, sir. I only saw blood on  
the floor. I then went and told John Walsh.

To the Coroner—I saw Quirke, and blood  
flowing from his neck:

Did you see anything with him? No, sir; I  
saw blood on his hands, but I saw nothing in  
them.

Sergeant Quirke—Was there anyone in the  
wash house but himself?—No, sir.

John Walsh stated that he was in the day-room  
when the young fellow came and said a man was  
cutting his throat in the bath-room (wash-house).  
He went to the door and saw blood on Quirke's  
jaw and face, and a razor in his hand. He did  
not see Quirke do anything with it. The razor  
was open, and Quirke held it with his hand  
extended. Half a dozen people came, and Quirke  
was removed to the hospital.

John Murphy stated that he was in the day-  
room, and heard that there was a man in the  
bathroom after cutting his throat. He went and  
shoved in the door, and saw a hat on the wash  
stand. He looked behind the door, and saw  
Quirke with a penknife in his hand which he was  
moving near his throat. The razor was between  
his feet.

The Coroner asked if Quirke were cutting any-  
thing with the penknife?

Witness—He may be cutting his shirt. I saw  
him bleeding.

The Coroner asked if Quirke seemed to be  
hacking at his throat with the penknife.

Witness replied in the affirmative. He added  
that Quirke said he was sorry for what he had  
done.

Dr P J Cleary deposed that Quirke suffered  
from a large wound in the front of the neck  
which severed the windpipe, and he had lost a  
large quantity of blood. Witness and Dr Meade  
treated the patient, who was since under Dr  
Meade's care.

Dr Meade gave corroborative evidence, and said  
death was due to exhaustion from the injury to  
the throat.

The jury found accordingly, and that the wound  
was self-inflicted while temporarily insane.
