A German long range gun fired two projectiles on Complegne. No one was injured, and no damage was done.

Petrograd, Monday.

An official communique says Yesterday we repulsed and inflicted heavy losses on great forces of the enemy attempting to cross the river Windau, near Listzkow.

North of Prosnyz we re-captured all the advanced trenches which the enemy took the day

In Galicia during the 12th and 13th stubborn fighting was renewed, from Piskorwice on the San to Mosciska, the enemy attacking in dense columns on the front of the river Lubaezewka which he succeeded in crossing and captured the village on the Tuckla.

On the Dneister the enemy unsuccessfully attacked our bridge head. In the counter attack we took four hundred prisoners.

The Inquest.

Mr J. F. Barry, J.P., City Coroner, held an inquest in Barrington's Hospital at noon to-day as to the death of John Downey, a small boy, aged 12, who was struck by a motor-ear in Clare-street on Wednesday, 9th justant, sustaining injuries to the head, and causing death on Sunday morning.

The following jury were sworn:—Patrick Carey (foreman), Michael Collins, Peter Quilligan, Stephen Hall, John White, Thomas Campbell, Thomas Dillon, John Cross, John Madigan, Michael Howard, John Nash, and Wm Collier.

Head Constable Healy conducted the inquiry on the part of the Crown; and Mr H. O'B. Moran, selicitor, appeared for the father of the deceased

Mass Ethel Robinson, from the Nenagh district, the driver of the motor car on the occasion, and some relatives and friends of the young lady, were present at the inquiry.

Before going into evidence,

Mr Barry said he understood there was a desire on the part of ldr James O'Brien, solr, Coroner for North Tipperary, to make a statement regarding the case, and if it was agreeable to the jury they would hear him.

The jury having acquiesced.

Mr O'Brien, solr, said he appeared as reprecenting Miss Robinson, the driver, and her father, the owner of the motor car, and at the outset of the proceedings he was instructed to express their most sincere regret that this unfortunate accident should have occurred. The jury would agree with him that the distress person who was unwittingly the cause of a death of this sort was next to that felt by the next of kin. If the jury wished Miss Robinson would give evidence and tell them how the accident occurred, and when they heard her the Coroner, and the jury, would unresitatingly agree that the fatality was purely the result of scoudent, and that no foresight or care was omitted on the occasion by the young lady. He (Mr O'Brien) was glad to be able to tell the jury that Mr Moran, solr., and himself had agreed as to a settlement with regard to the compensation to be allowed to the father of the boy, Although the legal liability for an accident of this sort was little or nothing from the pecuniary point of view still his (Mr O'Brien's) client recognised that the accident was the cause of death, and he did not desire to stand on any legal right. He wished to assuage the grief of the boy's father, and he had accordingly with the concurrence of Mr Moran, agreed to make a monetary payment to the father by way of compensation, exceedingly fair and reasonable in the circumstances. It was a gratuitous and generous payment, and Mr Moran agreed with him (Mr O'Brien) that was so.

Mr Moran, solicitor, on behalf of the father of the boy, said he had very much pleasure in accepting Mr O'Brien's expression of regret on the part of the young lady and her father. It was his (Mr Moran's) duby very often, when addressing juries like the present, to press a charge of negligence, but in this case his duty was of an entirely different character, and he might say that the action at the other side was in no way owing to pressure or threat. The settlement arrived at was, as Mr O'Brien stated, voluntarily made and gladly accepted, though not on the basis of any legal liability. It was his (Mr Moran's) duty to make inquiries into the case, and it afforded him the greatest possible pleasure to be able to state, as the result of his inquiries, that the lady who was the driver of the car, and the other occupants of the vehicle, were in no way responsible for the death of the boy. They did all that was possible to prevent it, and on behalf of the father he wholly acquitted the young lady from any responsibility for the accident. She did everything that could be done to prevent the accide and avoid it, as did the other occupants of the ear. On behalf of the boy's father he desired to thank Miss Robinson and her father for the very generous way they had soted in the case, and for

their practical sympathy over the accident. Mr Barry said he was sure Mr O'Brien stated truly the feelings of the young lady and her father with respect to the death of the boy. The jury, however, would have to hear the evidence and decide on it quite irrespective of the arrange ments made putside.

Evidence was then given.

Martin Downey, father of the deceased, said be saw the boy about 9 o'clock on the morning of Wednesday last, the 9th instant. The boy was then in his usual health, and witnessed advised him to go to school. Witness did not see him afterwards mutil he saw him in the hospital. The boy, who was turned 12 years of age, had not gone to school. The lad's mother is dead. The child died about half-past six o'clock on Sunday morning, 13th inst.

Catherine O'Loghlen, Clare Street, said that on the morning of the accident she was at her own door, and saw a motor car coming from Kilmurry towards the city. She could not say it was going very fast. There was a woman playing a banjo in the street not far away from where the accident occurred. Head Constable Healy said Miss Robinson was present, and he understood she desired to give widence. She was not bound to do so, but if she purposed giving evidence it would be the duty of the Coroner to warn her before so doing.

Mr O'Brien said if it was thought necessary Miss Robinson would give evidence, out they had, from the testimony of the witnesses, heard practically all that had occurred on the occasion. Miss Robinson was at present rather unnerved by what took place, but if the jury wished she could be examined.

Mr Barry asked did the jury desire to have the young lady examined.

Several jurors answered in the negative, and Mr Barry said as the jury did not require Miss Robinson's evidence, he would close the inquiry with the medical evidence.

Dr John Holmes was then called, and deposed I am surgeon of Barrington's Hospital. On Wednesday, June 9th instant, about 11.5 a.m John Downey, the deceased, was brought to the hospital in an unconscious condition. He had hæmhorrage from the ears and mouth, abrasions on left ear and left ankle, contusions on left log and left shoulder. He died on Sunday, 13th inst, ac about 6.45 a.m. In my opionion the cause of death was fracture of the base of the skull.

The jury having consulted found that the death of the boy was due to fracture of the base of the skall, and that they considered the driver of the motor car was in no way to blame for the regrettable accident.
