RAILWAY FATALITY AT LIMERICK

Workman Killed on Line

Late on Wednesday night the remains of Stephen O'Shea, aged 35, were discovered on the railway near the Foynes Junction by the driver the driver of the incoming Cork goods train that arrived in the city about 12 o'clock. It appears that O'Shea lived at the Blackboy, and was proceeding home when he met his death through being run over by, presumably, the night mail from the city. The body, which presented a mutilated appears ance, was taken into the station and placed in the third class waiting room. On Thursday morning the police of the district were apprised of the occurrence, and Sergeant Kelly wired to Dr Clery, the County Coroner, with a view to arranging for an induest. The deceased, who was a man of fine physique, was employed temporarily on the permanent way, and left work at a o clock on Wednesday. Some few months ago his wife died, and he leaves one child to mourn his untimely end.


beyond the harvest of 1916.
