reasonable number of neutral steamers to sail as
passenger steamers under the American flag under
the above-named conditions.

DEATH OF MR JOHN DUNDON. SOLICITOR.

We announce with very sincere regret the
death, which occurred last evening at his resi-
dence, 101 George Street, of Mr John Dundon,
solicitor. He had been in failing health for some
time past, but hopes were entertained of recovery
in due course. The news of his demise will be
heard of with deep regret in City and County,
where he was so deservedly esteemed and
respected. A member of an old County Limerick
family, he was son of the late Mr Wm Dundon, of
Barakyle, and choosing the law as his profession
he served his apprenticeship to the late Mr Joseph
Murphy, of Limerick. He was admitted a
Solicitor in the Michaelmas term of 1868, and
for some years was in partnership with the late
Mr D. S. Doyle, and later on with Mr J. A.
Doyle, solicitor. Some twenty years ago he
opened business in his own account, and enjoyed
an extensive private practice, as well as occupying
some public positions, including that of Law
Adviser to the Corporation, which office he held
since 1894, and resigned quite recently owing to
failing health; Solicitor to the Harbour
Commissioners, and also to the Gas Committee.
He was formerly an Alderman of the city, and a
Nationalist in politics he took a leading part in
political affairs many years ago. He was a gentle-
man of a most kindly and courteous disposition,
and however he might differ with others politically
was held in the highest esteem by all who knew
him professionally or privately. By his colleagues
in the law and by a wide circle of friends his
demise is deeply mourned, and sincere sympathy
is expressed with his sorrowing widow and
family. Mr Dundon was in the 69th year of his
age. The funeral will leave for Clounauna to-
morrow (Sunday) from St Michael's R.C Church
at 1.30 p.m.
