

In the Chancery Division yesterday, before the Master of the Rolls, in the matter of James Anstey and Sons, Ltd, and the Companies (Consolidation) Act, 1908, an originating motion was heard on behalf of Mr Frederick Robert Goodbody, of Summerfield, Rhyl, North Wales, and Mrs Isabella Goodbody, his wife, for an order at two transfer deeds, dated respectively the 2nd May, 1915, executed by Mr Goodbody in favour of his wife should be registered by the company, and that the register of members of the company might be rectified by striking out Mr Goodbody's name in respect of certain shares, and substituting therefor the name of his wife. The company carry on a large milling business in the county of Limerick, and the shares are all held privately. The matter in controversy was purely a family nature, and some questions of law were raised.

Lieut H C Lowry, A.V.C., wounded, is the only son of the late Mr J Lowry, J.P., Magheramorne and Bellast, and practised as a veterinary surgeon in Larne. He had been serving in Gallipoli for several months.

Second-Lieut C A Galt Gamble, 2nd Leinster Regiment, who is in hospital suffering from shock, is a son of Mr T E Galt-Gamble, C.I., R.I.C., Cavan. He is only in his 19th year, got his commission last November, and took a draft of the Royal Irish to France in May after joining his own regiment.

Accident to a County Limerick Airman.

While motoring behind the British trenches, Mr Gerald White, R.F.C. (son of Mr E. Woulfe-White, Coole, House, Athea, County Limerick), sustained a rather severe accident, which incapacitated him from duty for some days. An enemy shell struck his car and wrecked it, and hurled him through the wind-screen and over a steep embankment, where for some time he lay dazed. A comrade in the car with him was horribly cut up. The dust raised by the car attracted the enemy, and shells were immediately thrown in its direction.

County Limerick Soldier's Death.

A report has been received from the War Office notifying the death of Private P. Kerins, 3rd Royal Irish Regiment, which occurred at Limburg (Lahn) Prison Hospital, Germany, on the 17th May, 1915. The cause of death is not known. Mrs Kerins, Herbertstown, County Limerick, the mother of Private Kerins, has received the following message:—"The King commands me to assure you of the true sympathy of his Majesty and the Queen in your sorrow.—KITCHENER."

Seven Sons in the Army.

Mrs McKnight, of Henry Street, Limerick, who has seven sons serving at the front, has received official information that another of her boys, Daniel McKnight, 1st Munsters, has died from wounds received at the Dardanelles. He is the second son of this family who has fallen for his country. Three other sons as already stated, have been wounded in action.
