## COUNTY LIMERICK TRAGEDY.

### SERVANT SHOT DEAD.

#### Gentleman Arrested.

A very sad and distressing tragedy occurred at Castle Hewson, Askeaton, on Tuesday morning, the victim being Mrs. Ellen Costelloe, 45 years of age, and a widow. The circumstances, which have occasioned deep gloom in the district, show that the deceased was employed as cook at the residence of Mr. Everard G. Hewson, Castle Hewson, and sometime about ten o'clock in the morning she was in the pantry about her work when she was shot, according to the medical testimony, through the right side, the bullet penetrating the heart and causing instantaneous death. How she was shot, and the motive, if any, have not transpired, but about half an hour later Mr. Hewson cycled into Askeaton and informed the police of the distressing occurrence. On being questioned he replied that he was afraid he committed the act, and pending enquiries he was detained. The circumstances were telegraphed to Limerick, and County Inspector Yates proceeded to Askeaton by the mid-day train. Later in the evening Mr. Everard Hewson was arrested by Sergeant Dillon on a charge of murder. He was brought before Mr. Edmund Westropp, J.P., and as the result of a short deposition by the sergeant he was remanded until yesterday and taken to Limerick prison.

The accused was brought out from Limerick by motor car on Wednesday morning, and at half-past eleven, in Askeaton Police Station, Mr. Edmund Westropp, J.P., took depositions in the charge preferred against the prisoner of feloniously and with malice aforethought murdering Ellen Costelloe, at Castle Hewson, Ballyengland, on the 13th instant.

District Inspector Meredith, Adare, prosecuted, and Mr. A. Blood-Smyth, solicitor, represented the prisoner who did not seem to realise his position in the least.

The accused was returned for trial to the next Assizes for the County Limerick.
