**DEATH OF MR OWEN
McCARTHY.**

The funeral of the late Mr Owen McCarthy, who
for many years carried on business as a stores
dealer in Mungret street, took place on Thursday
from St. Michael's R.C. Church, whither the
remains had been removed, the interment being in
Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The deceased,
who was turned seventy, was in poor health
for a considerable time past, suffering from
an affection of the stomach, and recently
the complaint took an acute form which terminated
fatally, death taking place at his residence, 2
Pery Street, on Tuesday morning. Mr McCarthy
was a popular citizen, a man of active business
habits, and one whose bright, social, good nature
made him a general favourite with a large circle
of friends. There is much sympathy with the
relatives in the loss they have experienced by
Mr McCarthy's demise.
