## GRETNA RAILWAY DISASTER.

### Signalmen and Fireman on Trial

The trial was opened in Edinburgh to-day of  
 James Tinsley and George Meakin, signalmen, of  
 Gretna, and George W. Hutchinson, fireman, of  
 Carlisle, the charge being that they were guilty of  
 a breach of duty, resulting in the accident on the  
 Caledonian Railway in May last and the deaths of  
 passengers and railwaymen.

The officials of Caledonian Railway stated that  
 had the lever collar blocking and back signal  
 been used as required by regulations, the troop  
 train would not have been allowed to proceed,  
 and the collision would have been avoided. Total  
 killed was 227, and injured 249, the number  
 killed might not be strictly accurate, as the

## DEMANDS OF THE RAILWAYMEN

The national demand of railwaymen for an ad-  
 vance of wages to meet the increased cost of living  
 was considered at the quarterly meeting of the  
 Executive Council of the National Union of Rail-  
 waymen in London yesterday. They do not  
 intend to make their views public until further  
 progress is made, and they are very anxious to  
 avoid any outbreaks during the war.

It is understood that it was decided not to con-  
 sider, separately, the position of each group of  
 men working for different companies. Among the  
 solutions which were suggested was an extension  
 of the present war bonuses of 3s to men with less  
 than 30s a week, 2s to men with 30s or more, and  
 1s 6d to boys under 18 years.
