charged for Press telegrams is to be raised from 1s per 75 words by day and per 100 words by night to half-a-crown—with an addition of 8d for 'copying'. A joint telegraphic message for publication sent from any part of the Three Kingdoms to the three Belfast morning papers yields 1s 4d to the Post Office now—none sharing being the cost of telegraphing to the first address, with a charge of 4d for 'copying' for the two other papers. Under the suggested new arrangement the G.P.O. will receive 3-10d for the same 100 words wired to the same three papers.

London "Express."—The fact that there is a nominal yearly loss of £200,000 on Press telegrams has regularly disturbed every new Chancellor of the Exchequer, but this loss is balanced by the revenue derived from the postage of the papers themselves, and by the innumerable answers to advertisements. Moreover, it must not be forgotten that without the newspaper the people would be left in complete ignorance, and would, consequently, be at the mercy of their rulers. The special telegraphic facilities have, therefore, been allowed in the public interest, and not to favour a particular trade. Without cheap telegrams, as far as the provinces are concerned, there can be no cheap news.

DEATH OF BROTHER COAKLEY.

We regret to announce the death which occurred on the 20th instant of the Rev. Br. T. P. Coakley. The deceased had been in failing health for some months, and a few weeks ago his illness becoming more serious he was placed under the skilled care of the Sisters of the Little Company of Mary in St. John's Hospital where he bore his last illness with exemplary patience and resignation. The venerable Brother was a member of an old Roman Catholic family of Rathduff, Co. Cork, and entered the Order of Christian Brothers over 50 years ago. On Wednesday Office was recited in the Christian Brothers oratory, followed by solemn Requiem Mass. Rev. M. McCarthy, P.P., Donoghmore, presided. The chapters were—Rev. J. O'Connor, Adm., St. Michael's, and Rev. R. Devane, C.C., St. Joseph's. High Mass was sung by Rev. J. Madden, St. Munchin's College; Rev. T. Colbert, St. Munchin's College, Deacon; and Rev. M. Hanrao, C.C., St. Michael's, Sub-Deacon; Rev. J. Carroll, C.C., St. John's, Master of Ceremonies. The other clergy present were—Rev. Wm. Dwane, C.C., St. Michael's; Rev. J. FUNERAL OF M. BUTLER LEVY.
