## WICKSWELL PETTY SESSIONS.

at the Petty Sessions on Tuesday last, before Mr R. M. and Mr J. F. ## IRISH LITERATURE MAIL BAG FOUND.

During the past week wreckage of a miscellaneous character has been washed up in the Derry-Caherdaniel districts, near Waterville. Amongst the wreckage were found many old books and newspapers. The "Daily Express" learns that Lieutenant-General Sir Thompson Capper, K.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O., and Major-General G. H. Thesiger, C.B., C.M.G., A.D.C., were killed in the recent fighting in Flanders. Sir Thompson Capper was recently promoted Lieutenant-General and placed in command of an Army Corps. He had been on active service on the Continent since soon after the outbreak of the war. He was wounded in France some months ago, and returned as soon as he was well enough to go to the front. He was formerly Inspector of Infantry, and saw active service in Chitral, the Soudan (1898), and South Africa. Major-General Thesiger was promoted from the rank of Brigadier-General on September 3. He served in the Nile Expedition and the South African War with the Rifle Brigade, and was Inspector-General of the King's African Rifles for four years.

Second-Lieut Roger Poore, R.F.A., killed in Flanders, was the only child of Admiral Sir Richard Poore, a relative of the family of the Earl of Belmore, Enniskillen.

Captain R. B. Talbot Cliff, R.F.A., who has died of wounds received in Flanders, formerly held a commission in the 6th Inniskilling Dragoons.

Second-Lieut C. A. P. Taunton, South Staffs Regiment, was a son of Mr T. H. Taunton, of Liverpool, Secretary of the Royal Liver Society. Deceased, who was only 20 years of age, was educated at Stonyhurst, where he won many honours, and was studying at Oxford when war broke out, then joining the public schools Battalion of the Royal Fusiliers.

Captain the Hon Gerald Legge, South Staffs Regiment, killed in Gallipoli, son of Lord Dartmouth, was a grand-nephew of the Countess of Leitrim, who died in 1892, and was related also to the houses of Cavan, Conyngham, and Charlemont. He was a relative also of Mr John Dunville, son of the late Mr R. G. Dunville, D.L., Hollywood, formerly secretary to the Duke of Devonshire.

## County Limerick Man Killed at Ypres

We regret to announce another addition to the ranks of the many Limerick gentlemen who have given their lives for their country. Mr George Lloyd, youngest son of Mr Thomas E. Lloyd, Heathfield, Kilmee, was in Canada when war broke out, and immediately joined the 1st Contingent of the Canadians. He was sent to the front early in the present year, and fell in his first engagement on April 22nd in a charge on the German trenches, at Langemarck near Ypres. Mr Lloyd, who was aged 36 years, was reported missing last April, and it was only on Monday last that his relatives received confirmation of his death. He was a very popular gentleman, and took a keen interest in football and other pastimes. By his comrades in the regiment deep regret is felt at his death, and the sympathy of very many friends in County Limerick will go out to his father and brothers in their great sorrow.

### BLOWN UP
