Sir Thompson Capper was recently promoted Lieutenant-General and placed in command of an Army Corps. He had been on active service on the Continent since soon after the outbreak of the war. He was wounded in France som months ago, and returned as soon as he was well enough to go to the front. He was formerly Inspector of Infantry, and saw active se vice in Chitral, the Soudan (1898), and South Africa. Major-General Thesiger was promoted from the rank of Brigadier-General on September 3. He served in the Nile Expedition and the South African War with the Rifle Brigade, and was Inspector-General of the King's African Rifles for four years.
