## DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN THEATRICAL MANAGER.

### A Stud in County Limerick.

Mr George Edwardes, the well-known theatrical  
manager, died early yesterday morning at his  
residence, Park Square, West, Regent's Park,  
London, in his sixty-third year. Mr Edwardes  
had been for some time in failing health. He  
was in Austria at the outbreak of war, and was  
for a time interned there.

Mr George Edwardes was identified more with  
racing in England than in Ireland, but most of  
the horses he owned were bred in this country at  
his own stud at Ballykisteon, Co Limerick. Mr  
Edwardes achieved more successes on the Turf  
than any other of his theatrical contemporaries  
have ever attained in their sporting ventures.  
Starting in 1897, he was quickly favoured with  
fortune, as in the following year he purchased for  
190 guineas the colt by Queen's Birthday out of  
Merry Wife, who was subsequently named Santoi.  
This colt was the best horse Mr Edwardes ever  
owned, as in his four-year-old career he won over  
£11,000 in stakes, among the prizes won being  
the Brighton Cup, the Ascot Gold Cup, Great  
Jubilee Handicap, and Coronation Stakes at  
Kempton Park. Profitable as had been Santoi's  
career on the racecourse, it was as a sire that he  
achieved the greatest success. Like the other  
stallions owned by Mr Edwardes, Santoi took up  
his quarters at Ballykisteon, and proved a valuable  
acquisition to this already prosperous stud. The  
late Mr Edwardes' brother, Major Edwardes, is  
also a keen follower of racing, and of recent years  
has met with a considerable share of success in  
Ireland with the horses trained by himself at  
Bansha.
