LIVE STOCK ORDER.

The following resolution was forwarded to the Department of Agriculture—That the Department of Agriculture be requested to immediately revoke that portion of the Maintenance of Live Stock Order of 1915 which prevents the removal out of Ireland without a license of calf cattle, as these cattle are removed to England not for slaughter but for milking purposes. In forwarding the resolution the Secretary stated that large numbers of these cattle which might have gone to the grazier, and ultimately to the butcher, are kept by the farmers of this country for milking purposes, with a view to enabling them to meet their liabilities at this season of the year, as a large trade exists between this country and England during such season with the object of replenishing the dairies of the milk contractors of England; and to hamper them in the shipping of said cattle would cause serious loss and inconvenience to the people of both countries.

The Department in reply stated the order was a very necessary one for maintaining a sufficient stock of cattle in this country. As the Department did not consider there was any serious hardship they, therefore, could not see their way to modify. No action was taken.

The other business was routine.

ACCIDENT NEAR OOLA.

Constable Bryan O'Mahony, of Kilmallock, who was returning from duty at the Limerick Races, rushed to the door, which he found to be open, but there was no appearance of the man. He then endeavoured to utilise the communication cord, but without result. However, on arrival at the Limerick Junction, he reported the occurrence, and a party who went to the scene found a man there and had him conveyed by train to a Limerick hospital.

Cullinan, both of the 7th Royal Dublin Fusiliers, Barristers-at-Law, and members of the Munster Circuit, who were killed at the Dardanelles in the cause of liberty and civilization, and whose heroic conduct in the field of battle has shed fresh lustre on the military annals of the Irish race; and that we tender our sincere sympathy to their respective families.

Lieut-Col Bertram Lefroy. D.S.O.

Lieut-Col Bertram P Lefroy, D.S.O., commanding the 2nd Bat; Warwickshire Regt, who died from wounds received in action in France on 27th September, was one of the youngest Lieutenants-Colonel's in the Regular Army. He was a direct descendant of Colonel Anthony Lefroy, who commanded the 9th Light Dragoons in Limerick in 1760, and who was a member of a distinguished Flemish family, driven out of that country in 1569. Lieut-Col Lefroy, D.S.O., was killed not far from Cambrai, the greater part of which belonged to his forefathers prior to 1569. He went through the Boer War, after leaving Sandhurst, in the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, and was given the D.S.O. for holding Itala Hill with twenty men of mounted infantry of that Regiment all night until relieved, though at the time shot through the stomach. During the present war he was twice mentioned in despatches, and received that valued decoration, the French Legion of Honour. He is the fourth member of his family killed in the present war. Fifty-four of them are at present serving their country.

Death of a Limerick Man at the Dardanelles.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Richard Lunn, son of the late Mr R Lunn, Wickham street, Limerick, who was killed in action at the Dardanelles on the 6th August last. Mr Lunn, who went to Australia some time ago, joined the Imperial Forces at the outbreak of the war, and sailed early. He arrived at the Dardanelles on the 5th of August, but met his death on the next day. The late Mr Lunn was well-known in Limerick City and County, and prior to his departure was a well-known local athlete. His many relatives and friends in County Limerick and in sporting circles will much regret his demise at the early age of 23 years.

The "Times" unofficial list of officers killed contains the names of Lieut-Colonel Charles Arthur Armstrong, 2nd Northumberland Fusiliers; Lieut-Colonel A G E Egerton, commanding the 1st Coldstream Guards; Captain the Hon Eergus Baves Lyon, Black Watch, fourth son of the Earl of Strathmore; and Second-Lieutenant Dennis Ivor Day R.F.A., a Cambridge rowing Blue of 1914. Colonel Egerton was only 36.
