Another German Outrage.

English Lady Executed in Brussels.

Press Bureau, Friday, 10.30 pm.
The Foreign Office are informed by the United States Ambassador that Miss Edith Cavell, lately head of a large training school for nurses at Brussels, who was arrested on the 5th August last by the German authorities of that place, was executed on the 13th inst, after sentence of death had been passed on her.

It is understood that the charge against Miss Cavell was that she had harboured fugitive British and French soldiers and Belgians of military age and had assisted them to escape from Belgium in order to join the colours.

o far as the Foreign Office are aware no charge of espionage was brought against her.

Rev John Gwynn, S.J.

We regret to record the death of the Rev. John Gwynn, S.J., which, as announced by the War Office, occurred on the 12th inst., in France. Father Gwynn, who had been attached to Mungret College, volunteered for the front shortly after the outbreak of war, and was appointed chaplain to the Irish Guards. He was wounded in January last, and since then his health has not been good. He was in hospital more than once, suffering from rheumatism.

Born in Galway in 1866, he entered the Society of Jesus in 1884, and studied in Louvain University. He was subsequently a Professor in Clongowes and in University College, Dublin. He was a member of the Governing Body of University College. The news of his death has been heard of with great sorrow in Limerick.

Urgent Message from Lord Ritchener.

The Birmingham Post has received the following message from Lord Kitchener to the people of Birmingham, with reference to the recruiting campaign in that city:—

"I am glad to hear of the recruiting campaign in Birmingham. You have already done much. I ask you to do more. I need more men, and still more, if the armies now in the field and the armies which will, in their turn, proceed abroad are to be kept at their proper strength. I appeal earnestly to all men who are able-bodied, and can be spared to respond to the call, unless they are satisfied to allow the many lives given by their gallant fellow-townsmen to have been given in vain. I can only do my duty by the country if you do yours by me. We must have more men, and at once."

Sir Edward Carson and the Cabinet.

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" He has Resigned."

The Lobby correspondent of the "Daily News and Leader" states—The truth about Sir Edward Carson's position is this. He has resigned his office, but the Government do not announce the fact because they hope that in the interests of unity he will withdraw his resignation. He issued a semi-official dementi on Wednesday night, and this is regarded as a sign of grace, although he has not yet withdrawn his resignation, and therefore did not, of course, attend the Cabinet yesterday. It is not known what is the real reason for Sir Edward's resignation; he does not appear to have made his position clear.

Greece Must Fight Bulgaria

The "Times" discussing the choice of Greece's says:—Greece must fight Bulgaria if she is not to sink into utter subservience. If the does not fight now, she will have to fight in a few years, and then the fight may well be the hopeless duel predicted by the ex-Premier. It is not for us to suggest what means the Allies may employ to bring home to her people, in ways which cannot be misunderstood, the advantage of accepting their invitation to act with them, and the disadvantages of rejecting it.

But it does not require much imagination to discern that the dominant Mediterranean Powers can imply strong incentives to a flourishing maritime and commercial State in favour of compliance with their friendly representations. That those representations will be firm as well as friendly we have no sort of doubt. The situation does not admit of half measures any more than it admits of uncertainty or of delay.

Five Thousand Civilians Shot in Belgium by Germans.

Havre, Eriday.

From official reports which have reached the Belgian Government, it appears that Prussian soldiers, by orders of their chiefs, have shot in Belgium more than 5,000 civilians. This figure, it is pointed out, is approximate and provisional, for numerous local bodies, fearing reprises, have not dared to draw up official reports on the matter. Here are the figures at present known:

—In Antwerp, 200; in Brabant, 800; in Flanders, 100; in Hainault, 400; in Liege, 845; in Limbaurg, 40; in Luxembourg, 1,000; in Namur, 1,800.

SURPLUS OF MUTTON IN VICTORIA.
