Enemy Repulsed at Various Points.

French Maintain Advantage Already Gained.

Paris, Saturday. This afternoon's French Wireless says:— In Artois the French made progress towards Bois-en-Hache, and occupied portions of the German trenches. To the south of Souchez the Germans attempted to attack in the neighbourhood of Hill 140. They were repulsed. In Champagne, in the neighbourhood of La Courtine, the Germans attempted to re-take the trenches captured yesterday, but they completely failed before the resistance of the French troops, who everywhere maintained the advantage previously gained.

GENERAL JOFFRE

Visits Buckingham Palace.

General Joffre, Commander-in-Chief of the French Army, who is temporarily in London as the guest of the French Military Attache, motored today to Buckingham Palace and Marlborough House to pay his respects to the Queen and Queen Alexandra and express in person his sympathy for the mishap which befell the King while on a visit to France. General Joffre paid other visits and was at the War Office for a short period.

French Ministerial Crisis Over.

M BRIAND PREMIER.

It is announced that M. Viviani has resigned the French Premiership, and that M Briand has formed a Ministry.

M. Briand's appeal to all concerned facilitated a settlement.

Greece and Rumania's Attitude.

SERBIAN ARMY INTACT.

ENEMY NOT YET REACHED FIRST LINE OF DEFENCE.

Not Too Late to Send Assistance.

Reuter's Agency is informed that telegrams from Nish state any retirement of the Serbian army is being made in good order. The army is intact, and the enemy has not yet reached the first line of the Serbian defence. It is declared that it is not too late to send assistance, and that even with small Allied reinforcements the Serbians will be in a position to hold the Germans for several weeks.

British Auxiliary Sweeper Sunk IN COLLISION.

One Hundred Missing.

The Admiralty announces that during Thursday night H.M.S. Hythe, auxiliary sweeper was sunk after collision with another of his Majesty's ships off the Gallipoli Peninsula.

She had aboard 250 men, in addition to her crew. One hundred are reported missing.
