NEWSPAPERS FOR ABROAD.

By a recent regulation the Post Office is refusing to forward papers to neutral countries on the Continent or to America, etc., on or after November 6th. No newspaper or magazine sent by an individual is permitted to leave this country under the circumstances mentioned. The authorities, however, allow newspapers to be forwarded "if despatched from the offices of the publishers." Parties who desire to send the CHRONICLE abroad in future can do through this office. The idea underlying the Post Office prohibition is to prevent individual newspapers being marked or "coded" so as to give information to the enemy.
