SLIGO MURDER CASE

Husband Sentenced to death.

Angelo di Lucia, who carried on business as an ice cream vendor in Sligo, was found guilty on Thursday by a Dublin city common jury on a charge of the wilful murder of his wife on 8th December last.

Mr Justice Dodd pronounced sentence of death, and fixed the date of execution for Thursday, 2nd December. Jane Reynolds, a domestic servant in di Lucia's employment, was sentenced to death the previous day in connection with the same crime.

BOARD OF TRADE RETURNS.

SISTER OF POET SWINBURNE DEAD.
