Parliamentary Meeting.

At the Royal George Hotel, before a large audience, Mr T Cox Meech, B.L., a well-known journalist, and ex-Chairman of the Association in the House of Commons, delivered an interesting lecture, and one, which, by its nature, was a departure from the customary subject of "Thrilling Scenes in History," a subject, which from its nature, would have merited a larger gathering. At the request of Mr Meech, who spoke in a distinct and melodious voice, made reference to the changes in earlier times, and dealt with the old and how customs now seemingly antiquated in the past. By the help of lantern slides, both serious and amusing, he was able to bring quite entertainingly to the audience some historic scenes in the past, starting with the time of King Alfred and through the period of King Henry II down to our own days, and the events on the floor, famous fights in the House of Lords and Commons, and Parliament were all vividly described by the speaker. The allusion was also made to some of the most interesting events of the past, and the part of his theme that Mr Meech dealt with was his best. He kept his audience in a rapture by his impersonations in voice and mannerisms of several members of Parliament, and as he poured forth words, more or less, of several well-known names, the effect was most delightful. The frequent plaudits of his audience, Mr Meech, Asquith, Carson, and the Parliamentary figures were to the amusement created by the speaker. The "Long Way to Tipperary," which was delivered by Lord Meech, was a most successful and amusing performance. The evening closed with a Bill Rentals, and a lecture on the "History of the House of Commons."
