## FUNERAL OF THE LATE LORD MASSY.

## STOP PRESS NEWS

On Thursday the funeral of the late Right Hon. Lord Massy took place for the family vault at Stradbally, Castleconnell. The remains, which were encased in a heavily mounted oak coffin, were conveyed from Kingsbridge by the 9.15 train, and reached Castleconnell Station a little before 1 o'clock. They were transferred from the mortuary carriage to the hearse in waiting, and the funeral immediately left for the last resting-place. The shield which was let into the lid of the coffin bore the following simple inscription:—

JOHN THOMAS WILLIAM,  
6th Baron Massy,  
Died 28th November, 1915,  
Aged 90 years.

The cortège was large and representative, and was a striking tribute to the esteem and popularity of the late Baron. En route to Stradbally the utmost respect was shown to the deceased nobleman. Houses were closed as the sad procession passed, and window-blinds drawn. On arrival at Stradbally the coffin was taken into the church, where the burial service was held. The Bishop of Killaloe, the Right Rev Dr Berry, was present in his robes, and the service, which opened with the Psalm, was conducted by the Rev. L. Davis, M.A., Rector of the Parish. At the close the remains were taken out to the solemn strains of the "Dead March in Saul," played on the organ by Miss Boyd, organist, and committed to the vault at the southern end of the sacred edifice.

POTATOES.—There were 30 loads in market to-day. Prices:—4d to 7d per stone.

FRUIT—Eating apples, 1s 6d to 3s 6d per basket; baking apples, 2s 6d to 3s 6d.

FOWL—Chickens from 3s 0d to 5s 0d per pair; young ducks, 3s 0d to 4s 6d; hen turkeys, 10s 0d to 16s 0d; cock turkeys, 15s 0d to 23s 0d; geese, 7s 0d to 10s 0d.
