DEATH OF MR T F O'CALLAGHAN.

We regret to record the death which occurred at Droivick on Wednesday of Mr Thomas Francis O'Callaghan, youngest son of the late Mr Edward Hackett O'Callaghan and Mrs O'Callaghan, Yeovil, Limerick. The deceased, who was in his 28th year, was deservedly popular with a wide circle of friends, by whom the news of his unexpected demise has been heard with sincere regret, and deep sympathy is expressed with his respected relatives, and all Limerick families in their sorrow. The remains arrived in the city to-day by the 11.30 train from Droivick, and the funeral started for Mount St. Lawrence, where the interment took place. Despite the inclemency of the weather the cortege was large and representative, and confined to the hearse in which the deceased was held. The chief mourners were—Messrs Daniel, Eugene, Edward, and Michael O'Callaghan (brothers), and Mr E. J. Long, J.P. The Rev J. A. O'Connor, Adm, St. Michael's, officiated at the graveside.
