Resolution of Irish Unionist Alliance.

At a recent meeting of the Executive Committee of the Irish Unionist Alliance, held at the offices, 109 Grafton-street, Dublin, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

"That this Committee, representing Unionist opinion of the three Southern Provinces, desires to place on record its opinion that, in the event of a scheme of national service being introduced by the Government, it would be a national disgrace if Ireland were excluded, or any differentiation made with regard to this country.

Copies of the resolution were forwarded to the Lord Lieutenant and to the members of the Cabinet and other prominent Parliamentarians, all of whom duly acknowledged receipt.
