

# FUNERAL OF MR D. McNEICE.

The remains of the late Mr Daniel McNeice senior, 7 Harbour View, were interred, on Sunday, in Mount St Lawrence Cemetery. At two o'clock the coffin was taken out from St Michael's R.C. Church, where it rested overnight, and the funeral left for the last resting place. ## HEROIC KERRY WOMAN.

### A Soldier in Serbia.

Sergeant Flora Sandes, of the Serbian Army, who was wounded near Monastir, whose parents belonged to the Co Kerry, says, in the "Times"—  
"I had nearly reached the brink of the Bulgarian trench in which our men were already in grips with the defenders. I was one of a small group amidst whom a well-aimed hand grenade fell. A couple of men fell wounded, but I seem to have got most of the scatter. The shock was awful, yet I don't think I lost consciousness for more than a minute.

"A young officer crawled towards me on all fours, and pulled me over the snow to the shelter of the rocks. The torture of being dragged by the hand of my broken arm was acute, but the strain was soon over. Wonderfully deft and tender are Serbian soldiers in dressing wounds on the field. A couple of my own men did me up in the quickest time imaginable."

Miss Sandes, whose right side from shoulder to knee was lately a mass of torn flesh and shattered bone is progressing satisfactorily.
