## BODY RECOVERED FROM THE RIVER.

### The Inquest.

Mr J F Barry, J.P., City Coroner, and a jury  
held an inquest yesterday with reference to the  
death of a man, unknown, whose body was  
recovered from the river on Saturday afternoon  
during the prevalence of the storm. The following  
were sworn on the jury—John Kelly, foreman;  
J A Halvey, P J Rea, Wm McKnight, Denis  
Denny, J P Lynch, Michael Sadlier, John  
Warlin, J McHugh, J Lewis, J O'Flaherty, and  
Wm Barry.

Sergeant Heffernan represented the authorities,  
and in answer to the Coroner, said although the  
Constabulary had instituted every inquiry they  
failed to establish the identity of the deceased  
man.

Alec McCoukay, in the employment of the  
Limerick Harbour Commissioners, deposed to  
having seen the body in the river after 2 o'clock on  
Saturday afternoon. He procured a boat and had  
the remains removed to the Morgue. The  
deceased, who might be about fifty years of age,  
appeared to be some two months in the water, and  
the body was poorly clad.

Constable Minahan gave evidence as to the  
efforts made by the police, without result, as to  
the identity of the deceased.

Doctor J F Shanahan deposed to having made  
an examination of the body. There were no marks  
of violence. His examination led witness to believe  
that the case was one of drowning.

The Coroner—How long, doctor, would you say  
the body was in the water?

Dr Shanahan—Well, I could hardly say. It  
must have been some weeks at least.

The jury found an open verdict, and in accord-  
ance with the medical testimony.

#### SYMPATHY WITH THE CORONER.

Mr John Kelly, foreman, said the jury wished  
to convey to Mr Barry a vote of sympathy on the  
great loss he had sustained in the lamented death  
of his wife. They also wished to extend the vote  
of sympathy to the members of Mr Barry's family.

The Coroner said he was very grateful to Mr  
Kelly and the members of the jury for their kind  
sympathies. If sympathy could alleviate the loss  
he had sustained, he had more than his share of  
it, and he thanked them all for the great kindness  
shown to him in his trial. He hoped that the  
sorrow caused him in his loss would long remain  
away from the jurors and from those belonging to  
them. He thanked them very much for their kind  
vote of sympathy.

The proceedings terminated.
