

The promotion of Captain Leiryo, recruiting officer for Nenagh and District, to be Staff Officer the War Office in London, has given general satisfaction, writes a correspondent. Considering a great success as a recruiter, having secured out 1,500 men for the Army, it is no surprise at the War Office should have recognised his services to Ireland and the Empire, and promoted him to a more important position. His new post will afford him a field of operations where he can more fully use his great abilities in furthering the work which will eventually crush German power, and prevent ever again a repetition of German iniquity. Up to the last moment of his departure he was busily engaged in recruiting, and listed his 112th man from Killaloe just as he was leaving for London. His departure from Killaloe last Saturday was availed of by the habitants of the town to give him a hearty send-off, and to wish him "God-speed" and good luck in his new undertaking. At the railway station a large number of people (representative of all shades of opinion) assembled carrying banners, among which the Union Jack, and the National Emblem, stood side by side, and thus testified by their presence that all appreciated the good work in which Captain Leiryo is engaged. There is no doubt that Captain Leiryo carried away with him the good wishes of everyone in Killaloe, no matter what class he or she belongs, irrespective of creed or politics, and many is the earnest prayer for his safe return home.

CORPORATION AT ST JOHN'S CATHEDRAL

The Mayor and members of the Corporation paid the customary annual visit to St John's Cathedral on Sunday. Pontifical High Mass was celebrated, at which the Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer presided. The Mayor (Mr S B Quin, J.P.), who was attended by the High Constable and sergeants at mace, was accompanied by the Lady Mayoress, and his brother Mr James Quin, J.P., Miss Quin, and Mr Ger. Quin. The members of the Corporation present included—Ademan Joyce, M.P.; J O'Brien, A McNeice, and P McDonough; Councillors J O'Brien, J O'Mara, J Donnellan, D Griffin, M McInerney, M Griffin, T S Lawler, City High Sheriff elect; Thomas Duggan, C Johnson, J Gleeson, J Downey, J Greaney, M O'Callaghan, P Henihan, and James Lawlor. The Town Clerk, Mr W M Iolan, J.P., Mr J Dundon, Law Adviser, a number of the officials, and the members of the Corporation Fire Brigade, with their Superintendent, Mr Sheehan, were also present. High Mass was sung by Father Connolly, C.C., St John's, Father Kelly, C.C., do, being deacon, and Father Carroll, C.C., do, sub-deacon; Rev T McNamee, C.C., do, was master of ceremonies. The preacher was the Rev R Fitzgerald, Adm, do; and the assistant priests at the throne, Father Keane, Rector St Munin's College, and Fathers Vall and Hogan, do. After the religious ceremony the Mayor, the members of the Corporation, etc., were received by the Bishop. The sacred music was splendidly rendered by a special choir, under the conductorship of Mr Donald Irwin, I.S.M.

The Chairman, on behalf of the Governors, expressed thanks to the anonymous donor, and asked Dr Fogerty to have it conveyed. The meeting then terminated.
