Two Charges Dismissed.

At Cork yesterday, Terence McSweeney, an organiser of the Irish Volunteers, was charged by the police with having made statements likely to cause disaffection with, and hostility to, his Majesty's Government, and with having a cypher message in his possession. Government's Proposed Restrictions.

Protest From Limerick Typographical Society.

At the annual general meeting of the Limerick Typographical Society, Thursday last, Mr C G Carey, president (chair), the following resolution was passed:—"That we, in common with our workers in the printing trade in this country, with alarm, see the effect of the suggested restrictions in the importation of paper and paper materials. The printing trade has almost adversely affected by war restrictions. The present suggestion be carried out to the unemployment of a large number of persons engaged in the printing and allied trades. We strongly protest against the suggestions on such imports, and call upon the House of Parliament for the district to determine withdrawal. That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the local members of Parliament—Sir Walter Nugent, M.P., Mr John M.P., Sir Edward Carson, M.P., and Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, and Mr John Christie, Secretary.
