LONDON AND NORTH-WESTERN RAILWAY.

Meal Cars to be Discontinued
The London and North-Western Railway Company announce that all breakfast, luncheon, tea,

and there is testified to by the "Cape Times" (on which the writer served several years) of March 18th, 1916, which, in a sub-leader, states:—"Major W. Finch, the popular secretary of the S.P.C.A., leaves to-day for Ireland by the Kenilworth Castle. Major Finch bows himself off the stage in a genial letter, and the best wishes of his many friends in the Peninsula will follow him across the sea. All is not yet as the lover of dumb animals would like to see it in the Peninsula, but there has undoubtedly been a great advance in this respect for which Major Finch is mainly responsible, and for which he deserves the thanks and kindly memories of the community."

ANTARCTIC RELIEF EXPEDITION.

Lady Shackleton is anxious that a relief ship should be got ready without delay, leaving in August at latest for the Weddell Sea in view of the new mystery caused by the non-arrival at Buenos Ayres of Sir Ernest's ship, the Endurance. She is afraid the delay is due to weather conditions, and says that in any case there is sure to be a shortage of coal, which may cause drifting or travelling under sail.

If the Endurance does not turn up soon, she says, she has either foundered or been frozen in, but Sir Ernest would in the latter case land his hut and stores, as did the shipwrecked Swedish expedition some years ago. The vessel may have gone into one of the bays of the Weddell Sea in open water which has since been frozen, as in the case of the Discovery, Capt Scott's first Antarctic Expedition, which was not liberated till the ice broke up the following year.

DEATH OF MR J MORAN, GALWAY, CO. SURVEYOR.

Much regret is felt in County Galway at the death of Mr John Moran, surveyor for the western portion of the county. He had been suffering from pneumonia, and died on Friday evening at his residence, Gentian Hill, Galway. Mr Moran was a native of County Limerick, and a graduate of Galway University. He had arduous duties to perform, as he had charge of the difficult areas in Connemara, and often rode seventy miles in a day on an ordinary "push" bicycle. Up to a few years ago, he had the whole county under his charge, but owing to the large extent of the county he relinquished the eastern portion.
