

Captain J. B. Gaffney.

We are pleased to see in the "London Gazette" this week that Second Lieut. John Burke Gaffney, of the Royal Irish Regiment, has been appointed temporary Captain. Captain Gaffney is the second eldest son of Thomas Burke Gaffney, S. O., of Waterloo Road, Dublin, and nephew of St. Columba, Reverend Mother of the Presentation Convent, Hareford. His promotion has been rapid and most marked and creditable. Mr. Thomas Burke Gaffney is son of Edward Gaffney, Esq., C.E., and was educated at the Catholic University, Dublin. He entered in 1885 the General Valuation Office in Ireland and became Chief Valuer, retiring in 1904. He married Jean, daughter of P. O'Donnell, Esq., of Glenquin, Kilcormac, Co. Limerick. Her brother, as Head of Medical Department, in the present war, distinguished high distinction, and was twice mentioned in despatches.—*Tuam Herald*.

Coal Liable to Seizure.

Neutral shipowners are warned by the Government that coal of German origin—cargo or bunkers—is liable to seizure. Masters should carry certificates from the British Consul at bunkering ports proving that bunkers were supplied with his consent.

Complications in Greece.

Complications appear to increase daily in Greece. The sack affair is declined by Sir F. Elliot to be very serious; a Greek paper at Athens has been suspended for publishing navy reports over Greek territory is resented in some quarters, while in Athens a Venezelist meeting resulted in a riot, in which many supporters of the ex-Premier were arrested.

Common Cause of the Allies,

Baron Sonnino, Italian Minister for War, speaking in the Chamber on Saturday, Reuters reports, said the situation on the French front and Russia's success in Armenia confirmed the general effect of the Allies' meeting in Paris. The Economic Conference, to be held shortly in Paris, could have for its object the reparation in the economic domain of the solidarity in arms and interests of the Allies. They had agreed from now the abolition of the capitulations in Egypt. The British had proceeded with the nomination of a new Italian judge on the mixed tribunals, who had a position identical with that of the French judge nominated last year. He added that the Allies' object was to fight with all their might for a common cause.

MILITARY.

The 4th Battalion of the Leinster Regiment, under command of Lieut.-Col. Hamilton, are now in quarters at the New Barracks. The regiment, which has sent a number of detachments to the front, musters some 400 rank and file, many of whom have seen active service, and the majority being promising young soldiers. The band of the regiment, which had been on recruiting duty, arrived at headquarters on Saturday evening, and on Sunday morning it played the Catholic soldiers doing duty with the corps to and from Divine Service at St. Joseph's Church. The regiment will, it is understood, be stationed in Limerick for some time to come. The 4th Battalion of the Leinsters was originally the Queen's County militia, with headquarters at Maryborough, but it has been, now and for some time back, converted into a service battalion for duty at home or abroad.
