Lieutenant-Colonel Dann Wounded.

We regret to observe from the casualty lists published yesterday that Lieut. Colonel W R H Dann, Bedford Regiment, has been wounded at the front. This gallant officer is the eldest son of the late Canon Alfred G. Dann, formerly Rector of Kilkeedy (Clarina). Three other sons are also serving at the front.

Death of Gallant Limerick Soldier at the Front.

Official intimation has been received by Mr John Hogan, of the Limerick Corporation Fire Brigade, from the War Office, under date 25th instant, regretfully concluding that his brother, Sergeant T Hogan, 18th East Yorks Regiment, is dead, and that his demise took place on the 9th August, 1915, or since. This gallant soldier was, we learn, all through the war, and was wounded on no less than five occasions. He came to Limerick on the 28th July, 1915, on three days' leave, and departed again for the front on the 1st of August. A report received from Lance-Corporal Jackson, of his regiment, states that at 7 a.m. on August 9th:—"I took a message to the front, and saw Hogan and another man wounded in a 'Jack Johnson' hole in a German trench, which we had taken. Hogan said to me—"Go on Jackson, and get him away first, and I did get the other man away. Later, about 1 p.m., I returned for Hogan, but he had gone. The trench he was in was under severe fire all the while." Nothing, despite official inquiries, has since been heard of this brave Sergeant, and the War Office communication presuming his death is the final result. Lord Kitchener has also sent to his brother the following:—"The King commands me to assure you of the true sympathy of his Majesty and the Queen in your sorrow." Many friends in Limerick will extend their condolences to Mr Hogan and relatives in the loss of one who had so nobly done his part for King and country. Deceased was unmarried. Mr John Hogan, it may be added, has a son serving in the Royal Munster Fusiliers, and he is at present in England invalided from the front.

County Limerick Soldier Wounded.

Lance-Corporal P Shanahan, of the Munster Fusiliers, a native of Kilmallock, has been wounded in action in France. He was also wounded at Gallipoli during the fighting there.

County Limerick Chaplain.

Rev T E Kincaid, who is a native of Ballinveena, Kilfinane, is at present with the New Zealand Expeditionary Force as chaplain. He is a very zealous priest and is a great favourite with the men amongst whom he ministers.

Feeling in the United States.

The "World," commenting on Wilson's speech, says that the peasant mind bore no resemblance to that intimated by those speaking for the United States in Prussia. The "Herald" characterizes the speech as wise and conservative, although a concrete suggestion regarding immigration. "The Times" declares the President's old-world police plan which nobody advocates of blood and carnage could be carried out on the grounds of impracticability. The adoption of the President's plan constitutes a complete reversal of the policy of aloofness from alliances to which the United States had, hitherto, studiously adhered. The "Nieuwe Van Den Dag," says that the President's message states that the President is most seriously at work on mediation.—Reuter.

Italian Successes.

Yesterday's Rome communique states that in the Lagarina Valley on Saturday morning the enemy renewed bloody attacks against our positions on the Adige and Arsa Valley.
