SANCTIONED.
The Government Board wrote sanctioning the proposal to Dr M Graham for acting in the dispensary district for Dr Enright, and to Mr P Liston for acting as dispensary at the City Dispensary.

DWYER AND GENERAL MAXWELL.
The proposal was proposed:—"That we beg to express our most profound admiration for the courage, truthfulness, and patriotic reply to the proposal of General Maxwell, Commander-in-Chief of the British Army in Ireland, when that gentleman's punishment of some of the priests was because of their crime in Ireland that their first duty was to be unreservedly approve of every letter written by his lordship's commander's impertinent request."

The least they could do was to show respect to his attitude towards General Maxwell. There was no doubt that any fair-minded man would agree with what was contained in the bishop's second letter. Punishment should be meted out to the priests in South Africa, but it was not the logical conclusion to be drawn from the opening at that time to punish the priests for what had happened then. The same should be given to Irishmen who took part in the rebellion; they were shot down on an opportunity given them of being represented by a court-martial.

The court-martial had been the most drastic and far-reaching measure since the world over. It was seconded the resolution, which was passed unanimously, and copies ordered to be sent to Rev Dr O'Dwyer, Mr J. J. Ryan, M. Joyce, and Mr W. J. Conboy.

Y MEDICAL OFFICERSHIP.
The Local Government had received from the Guardians' proposal for the appointment of medical officer of the Urban Dispensary District, and in the terms of their circular letter had decided, as a matter of course, that they could not agree to this course of action during the war. They were following the same course on the matter, but would
