fire once more obliged us to evacuate the place.
The Germans at Vorontchine (N.E of Kisseline)
made repeated attacks yesterday. Our regiments
put them to flight, capturing 9 machine guns. At
3 a.m to-day, near the village of Raymiesto (on
the Stokhod N.E of Vorontchine), the enemy
attacked in massed formation. After hand-to-
hand fighting they fled.

There has been furious fighting in the region
of Kisseline and further south on our extreme left
wing. Our troops pursuing the enemy crossed
the Sereth. The prisoners and trophies taken by
General Brusilof's armies between June 4 and
17 were:

3,350 Officers 550 Machine Guns.
109,134 Men 189 Bomb throwers,
198 Guns, 119 Ammunition Waggon
and much other war material.

"On the Dwina front the Germans violently
bombarde the region of the Ikskull bridgehead
On the night of the 20th S of Smorgon they took
the offensive. In one sector they penetrated our
trenches, but were soon dislodged, and driven to
their own lines."

D.C.M. for Munster Man.

Amongst those on whom the Distinguished
Conduct Medal has been conferred for acts of
gallantry in the field is Acting Sergeant P O'Brien,

gallantry. He twice dived into a flooded trench
to retrieve boxes of grenades, and on other
occasions he has set a fine example of courage and
cheerfulness.

Death of Lieut J. St. J. Dundon.

We regret to announce the death, which has
occurred at Basra, Mesopotamia, of Lieutenant
James St John Dundon, R.A.M.C. The deceased
officer, who was in his twenty-fourth year, was
the fourth son of the late Mr John Dundon,
solicitor to the Limerick Corporation, and had a
very successful collegiate career. He was educated
at the Crescent College, Limerick, and at
Clongowes Wood, graduating at the National
University last March. His death occurred as
the result of illness contracted while on duty.
The cutting short of a promising career is deeply
regretted by a wide circle of friends in the young
officer's native city.

German Destroyer Damaged.

Amsterdam, Wednesday.
A despatch to the "Telegraaf" from the
Belgian frontier on Friday evening states that a
German destroyer has been damaged off Zeebrugge
by a mine explosion, but was successfully towed
into port, where she was moored. Yesterday
afternoon heavy gunfire was audible for some
time from the direction of Ostend.

Italian Gains.

"At the head of the Posina valley," says
yesterday's Italian communique, "we took a
strong position south-west of Mount Purche. On
the night of the 19th the enemy made three
surprise attacks on Mount Magnaboschi, which
were all repulsed with heavy losses. North of
Frenz la valley we continued our advance driving
back frequent counter attacks. Thirty-four of
our aeroplanes bombarded Perfine. Three hostile
air machines were brought down at Val Sugana.
