

and a week had but elapsed when Parliament was dissolved by the King. The elections followed, but the supporters of M Venezelos did not vote, with the result that a Chamber favourable to the wishes or inclinations of the King was returned, and that at a time, too, when the army was actually mobilised. It is, therefore, easy to see why the Allies now demand fresh elections on legal and constitutional lines, and the return to normal conditions of the electoral body after the army has been demobilised. Having regard to the trend of events in Greece, it is quite a possibility, bearing in mind his undoubted popularity, that the forthcoming appeal to the country will result in the return of M. Venezelos to power.

### THE LATE MR S. E. LEE, J.P.

At the City Petty Sessions yesterday, Mr Kelly said that Mr Roche had just reminded him that within the last twenty-four hours the Bench had lost one of its number in the person of Mr S. E. Lee. He had the privilege of meeting the late Mr Lee only on a few occasions, and from his short experience of him found him to be a very valuable colleague. Personally he valued his counsel on the Bench, and he felt sure he spoke for all his colleagues when he said how sorry he was to hear of Mr Lee's death.

Mr Roche said he desired to associate himself with the remarks of Mr Kelly. By the death of Mr Lee the Magisterial Bench of the city had lost an esteemed and valued colleague, and the city a good and worthy friend.

The funeral will take place from the deceased gentleman's late residence, Strand Villa, at 2 o'clock to-morrow (Sunday), for St Mary's Cathedral.

### DEATH OF FATHER HEAD, S.J.

We regret to record the death which took place on Thursday in St John's Hospital of the Rev Thomas Head, S.J., in his 74th year. The deceased, a Limerick citizen, was a well-known member of the Jesuit Order, of which he became a member in '79 from the secular clergy, to which which he was ordained. He was for a long number of years on the Limerick mission, was Rector of Crescent College community, but of late years was on the teaching staff of the Order at Mu g et College. Office and Requiem Mass was celebrated at the Jesuit Church this morning for the deceased, after which the interment took place at Mungret in presence of a large number of clergy, including His Lordship the Most Dr O'Dwyer.
