CABINET AND IRISH PROBLEM

Lord Selborne's Resignation.

Lord Selborne, writes the Political Correspondent of the "Morning Post," has left the Cabinet because of his disagreement with the policy expressed in the negotiations which have been carried on by Mr Lloyd George for a "settlement," as it is called, of the Irish question.

Lord Selborne's resignation may be either in connection with the contemplated settlement of the Irish problem, or with the withdrawal of labour from the land for the Army, says the "Daily Chronicle."

The Right Hon the Earl of Selborne, K.G., has resigned the office of President of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries. He will make a statement in the House of Lords on Tuesday next.

Irish Negotiations.

The Lobby correspondent of the "Daily News" writes:—The position of the Irish negotiations has naturally been much discussed in political circles during the week-end. A hopeful view is taken of their ultimate success since the result of the Nationalist Convention at Ballast. The outcome of the larger Irish Convention, which will be held this week, is awaited with more confidence.

LATE MAJOR TRIMBY, R.M.F.

The death of Major Henry Thomas Trimby, 2nd Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers, which took place at Ballymullen Barracks, Tralee, has removed from our midst a personage who will be long mourned by all who came in contact with him.

Major Trimby was a fine soldier, and a man who distinguished himself on many fields of war, and whose bravery and military ability was admired by his fellow officers and men of the gallant Munster Fusiliers.

At three o'clock on Wednesday the funeral started from Ballymullen Barracks in military procession, headed by the band of the Leicester Regiment playing the "Dead March in Saul," followed by a firing party of two hundred men and of the Depot of the Munster and Leicester Regiments.

CONSOLIDATION OF BRITISH AND IRISH EXCHEQUERS.

The Bill for the Consolidation of the British and Irish Exchequers produced a discussion in the House of Commons on Friday evening. The clause for appointing a Vice-Treasurer with a salary of £3,500, and a Deputy with £1,000 a year, to replace the officers, namely—Five Lords of the Treasury and two Secretaries, whose duties were abolished, was objected to by Sir J Newport, Mr Ponsobly, &c, and the latter Rt Hon Gentleman moved an amendment to substitute the sum of £2,000 a year for £3,500. The amendment, on a division, was negatived. The numbers for the Amendment were, 66; against it, 103—Majority, 42. Mr Ponsobly also moved that the clause rendering the Vice-Treasurer eligible to sit in Parliament, be omitted. The House divided again on this amendment, when the numbers stood—for it, 57; against it, 107; majority, 50. The Bill subsequently passed through a Committee, and the report was ordered to be brought up on Monday.
