Mr. Asquith, in the House of Commons yester day, informed Major Newman that no resolutions had been submitted to him, but he understood that certain important bodies in Ireland have expressed their agreement with the proposals submitted by Mr Lloyd George.

#### The Cabinet Vacancies.

The Parliamentary Correspondent of the Daily Chronicle" writes :-With Lord Selborne's resignation, there are now three vacancies in the Cabinet-namely, the Secretary for War, the Minister for Agriculture, and the Secretary for Ireland.

In a leading article, the "Daily Chronicle" declares that the secession of Lord Lansdowne, Lord Robert Cecil, and Mr Long, which is almost foreshadowed, at a critical stage in the war and on such an occasion as the coming together in agreement of the two main Irish parties, would dismay the British Dominions overseas, and would bewilder our Allies. These three Ministers have gained a European reputation by their work during the past year.
