LIMERICK PATRIOT DEAD
MR JOHN DALY PASSES AWAY

Mr John Daly, the Limerick patriot whose name was a household word wherever the Celt had found a home, has gone to his reward. He passed away this morning after a long and tedious illness, borne with the fortitude which was the great characteristic of his heroic soul and spirit. The late Mr Daly was a noble and inspiring figure. He had high ideals of Nationality, for which he paid the penalty of long and bitter suffering, and he kept to his old convictions and leanings unswervingly to the last. Over seventy years of age, his whole life was devoted, as far as he could, to the service of the land of his love. In his early years he attached himself to the Fenian movement, in which he became a prominent and trusted worker. In 1883 he was sentenced to penal servitude on a charge of being concerned in the dynamite conspiracy of the time. After spending 13 years in Portland Prison he was released, and on his arrival back in Limerick he received a tremendous ovation from his admiring fellow-citizens. Gifted with a fine intellect and a rare facility of speech, he was an eloquent and convincing speaker, and he was much sought after as a lecturer on National subjects and on important National occasions. In 1884, while in Portland Prison, he was elected member of Parliament for his native city, but he was disqualified by statute. In 1886, after being released and before returning to Limerick, he paid a visit to France in company with his brother, the late Mr James Daly. He entered the Limerick Corporation in 1896, the year after the passing of the Local Government Act, and represented the Irishtown Ward as Alderman until about ten years ago, when he retired from public life. He was Mayor during the three years 1899, 1900 and 1901, and it was during his Mayoralty the City Electric Light system was installed. In public and private life he was an honest, sincere and thoroughly upright man. Fearless in his advocacy of every good cause he championed, he left nothing that he could do undone to advance his country, which he loved with a passionate love, and to further the interests of the working classes, whose lot he did much to uplift and improve. His death, which will cause a pang of regret not only all over his native land but amongst the Irish abroad, removes the last of the great outstanding figures of the heroic movement with which he was identified in '07. To his relatives and friends we extend our sincere sympathy on the demise of one who was a noble character, a brilliant son of Limerick, and an Irishman of whom his motherland has every reason to be proud.

THREATENED DISPUTE AVERTED

LORD BISHOP ACTS AS ARBITRATOR

AWARD SATISFACTORY TO BOTH PARTIES
The threatened dispute between the Limerick carpenters and the Master Builders' Association has been settled by arbitration. Mr T J Partita (Dublin) on behalf of the Carpenters' Society, arrived in the city last week for the purpose of trying to effect a settlement. The men's demands were for an increase in the present rate of 34-hour week in summer of seven months at 7d per hour, and 31-hour week in winter of five months at 8d per hour, to 9d per hour of 51-hour week the year round.
