PREMIER'S TRIBUTE.

The Chairman read the following letter from the
Premier accepting the Lord Chief Baron's
resignation, and adding—

"I received your Lordship's proposal with
extreme regret, knowing well the inestimable
value of the service which you have rendered in
one of the highest posts on the Irish Bench for the
best part of half a century. As an old practitioner,
I venture to say that the judgments of Pallett,
C.B., are held in as high esteem by English and
American as by Irish lawyers. I cannot, however,
in view of what you report as to the state of your
health, ask you to reconsider your decision, but I
beg you to accept the assurance of my sympathy
and respect."
