## NEWCASTLE WEST UNION.

The Newcastle West Board of Guardians on  
Thursday decided to request the Local Govern-  
ment Board to sanction the appointment of Dr

At the District Council meeting a letter was  
read from the Local Government Board refusing  
to sanction the proposal to reduce the rents of  
cottages by 25 per cent.

A long discussion took place in connection with

for Knockaderry, Feenagh, Broadford, and Athea,  
and it was decided to again appeal to the Carnegie  
Trustees for sufficient money to complete the  
building of the libraries.

## PLUCKY RESCUE FROM DROWNING.

A plucky rescue from drowning was effected at  
Arthur's Quay shortly after six o'clock yesterday  
evening. A boy named John Ring, aged about  
eleven years, fell into the water, and was going  
down a third time when a man named  
Thomas Peckham, employed at Cannock's, without  
divesting himself of his clothing, jumped into the  
tide which was on the ebb, and though a non-  
swimmer made an heroic effort to save the boy.  
James Carmody, also employed at Cannock's, and  
Martin Fitzpatrick, printer, George-street, rushed  
along the quay side and seizing a life-buoy threw  
it out to Peckham and the boy, who were thus  
held up until a boat came along and took them  
both ashore, apparently none the worse for their  
immersion. Peckham is to be highly commended  
for his brave act.

## BRITISH CAPTAIN MURDERED BY HUNS.

### Indignation in Holland.

The Germans have shot Captain Fryatt, of the  
British steamer Brussels, after trial by court  
martial. He was charged with attempting to ram  
a German submarine.

This crime, which the Dutch papers compare to  
the shooting of Nurse Cavell, has evoked much  
indignation throughout Holland.

## MR E. CLIFFORD, R.A.M.C.

### Killed in Action.

Intimation has been received in Limerick that  
Mr E Clifford was killed in action in France on the  
26th of this month. Soon after the outbreak of  
war Mr Clifford joined the Royal Army Medical  
Corps. Having completed his training, he was  
sent to the Western theatre of war. He was  
married to a daughter of the late Major Trimby,  
Royal Munster Fusiliers, and was a member of  
the staff of the National Bank at Limerick for  
a number of years. His death has occasioned  
widespread regret among his colleagues, and the  
utmost sympathy is extended to his wife and  
family in their bereavement.

## Bishop of Ferns and Irish Question.

Dr Gregg, the newly-elected Bishop of Ferns  
and Leighlin, in his address to the Synod at  
Carlow yesterday, said he regretted the recent  
failure at settlement of the Irish question, but  
said a settlement must rest on something more  
substantial than an ambiguous phrase; but even  
if this settlement had not proved practicable, he  
did not think they were entitled to argue that no  
settlement was practicable. He hoped that in  
any effort towards conciliation members of their  
Church would take such part as it offered to them,  
and make it plain that if their home is in Ireland  
their heart is in Ireland too.

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
