Carter Killed.

Cornelius Ward, 45, married, employed by Messrs A Guinness Son and Co, Ltd, was killed in Carey's road, last evening under painful circumstances. He was employed in carting stout through Carey's road, and when approaching the railway bridge the horse bolted, with the result that he was thrown from his seat, and one of the wheels of the heavily laden dray passed over his body causing what was almost instantaneous death. The deceased was well and popularly known by the public, he having been identified with arrangements in connection with regattas and other local functions. For eighteen years he worked under Mr A J Eakins, who found him an excellent employe and a faithful friend. Some twelve months ago he became connected with the Guinness firm. He leaves a wife and five children to mourn his sad and untimely end.

The Inquest.

Dr J Roberts, Deputy Coroner, and a jury, held an inquest at 52 Edward street this afternoon on the remains,

Sergeant Hawkins, conducted the enquiry and Mr A Blood-Smyth, solr, appeared for Messrs A Guinness, Sons and Co, Ltd.

Mr Blood-Smyth before the evidence was taken said, he did not appear in any hostile spirit, but merely to express the Company's great regret at this unfortunate occurrence. Instructions had been given to Mr Jennings, the local manager to see that the family would be looked after and amply provided for.

Mr T V Jennings said he was in telephonic communication with the head office that morning, and they desired him to attend the inquest and express their keenest regret on the very sad occurrence. He would make his report to Dublin in due course, and he felt sure the case of the deceased's widow and family would receive the fullest consideration, he might say generous consideration.

Evidence of identification was given by Margaret Ward, wife of the deceased.

Francis Clery, of Upper Carey's Road, stated that the horse was travelling at a rapid pace when he noticed the deceased fall, and he sent for clerical aid, which arrived before the man died.

Robert Rose, Catherine street, having given evidence, Dr P F Graham attributed death to laceration of the right lung.

The Jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony.

British Official

Further Progress

NORTH-EAST OF POZIERES

Capture of Prisoners

(BRITISH OFFICIAL).

Last night was generally quiet except for hostile shelling of our lines south-east of Wood.

North-east of Pozieres we made further progress, joining all our local objectives, now being consolidated.

Seventy-two prisoners were taken.

South of Arras we raided the enemy and caused several casualties.

A similar attempt by the enemy in the trenches north-west of Hulluch met with no success.

The enemy exploded a mine south of us with no effect.

French Communiqué

Progress North of Somme.

Extensive Air Bombardment by French

Paris, Thursday

The French communique says:—

North of the Somme we made some progress.

In the Vosges an enemy coup-d'état was entirely unsuccessful, and caused 100 assailants.

Our air squadrons bombed the railway of Lassigny, Combles front (Somme), Appilly, Bazancourt, Sanincourt, and a battery of bivouacs.

In the region of Verdun there were 100 tiles dropped.
