THE A.O.H.

Northern Demonstration Reported Prohibited.

A Londonderry telegram states that the county demonstration of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, which was to have been held on Tuesday at Ballybofey, Donegal, has been prohibited by the military authorities. Six members of Parliament had promised to attend the meeting, namely, Messrs Dillon, Devlin, Keating, Hugh Law, Edward Kelly, and Swift MacNeill, whose names appear on the posters circulated throughout county Donegal. In a second communication which reached Londonderry shortly before midnight the committee explain that the military have prohibited excursion trains to the meeting, but, notwithstanding this order, the committee have decided to hold the meeting, as they are hopeful that the military restrictions will be withdrawn before Tuesday.

Inquiries at military headquarters in Dublin yesterday went to show that there is no truth in the statement that the military authorities had prohibited an A.O.H. demonstration at Ballybofey, Co. Donegal, on Tuesday. It is stated, however, that an order has been issued to the railway companies prohibiting the running of excursion trains to Ballybofey.
