An alarm was raised by some visitors staying at the Royal Hotel, whose proprietor, Mr John McKeogh, auctioneer promptly responded, and, calling on his brother, Dr H V McKeogh, buth proceeded to the scene of the ac ident, and after dragging the river for about twenty minutes succeeded in bringing the body to the bank, where Dr. Mckeog performed artificial respiration for about 30 minutes, but all to no avail, as life was found to be extinct.

The melancholy occurrence has cast a gloom over the neighbourhool.

The Coroner (Mr Brady) was communicated with, but he did not deem an inquest necessary.

## RESCUE FROM DROWNING.
