## GREECE MUST COME IN.

### Declaration by M Venizelos.

M Venizelos, in a message to Mr G J Stevens' the "Daily Telegraph" correspondent in Athens, says:—You can tell your readers that I heard with joy and great relief of the intervention of Rumania, and this joy is genuine, and with few exceptions general, among all Greeks, not only because it makes doubly sure your victory, but because it will help to hasten it. "It must also hasten a decision in my country, a decision that can no longer be delayed. We have made already one war, for our ten months of mobilisation the waste and loss of our war material; the strain on our financial resources, the sufferings and misery brought by the prolonged mobilisation of all the manhood of the country, and in addition the enemy's invasion of our territory, constitute in reality the misfortunes consequent on a war. We are now called upon to make a second war. This we must wage, for it is a necessity imperatively imposed by our most vital interests. We cannot avoid it nor can we delay it."

### LIMERICK PILOT'S SUDDEN DEATH.

John Behan, pilot, 55, of Mungret Street, died rather suddenly on Saturday evening. He was engaged taking the steamer "Catiebar" down the river and took ill, near Tarbert. His condition became worse as the vessel approached Carrigaholt where he was taken ashore, and died some time later, being seen by a clergyman and doctor.
